# Introduction to OSOR's country intelligence

## SCOPE

- **Political and legal frameworks**
- Major ongoing **open source software initiatives**

## STATUS

- **27 EU and UK** reports published in 2020
- **Status report** compiling all data published in December 2020
- Launch of the **worldwide** country reports

## METHODOLOGY

- Carrying out **desk research**
- **Feedback** from national contact points
  - Compilation of **final** country reports
  - **Analysis** of all findings to provide a **consolidated view** on the current status of open source policies in Europe

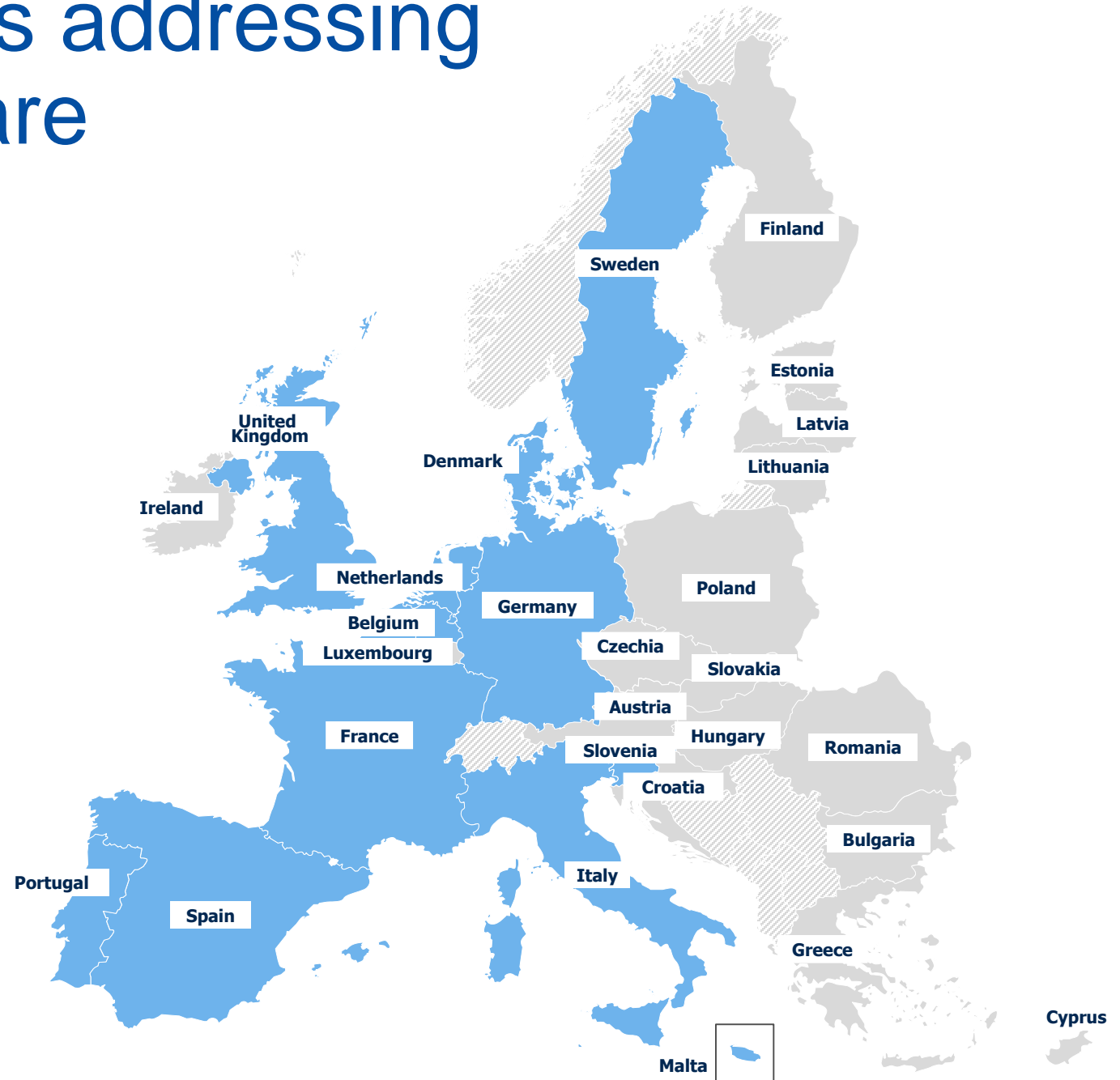

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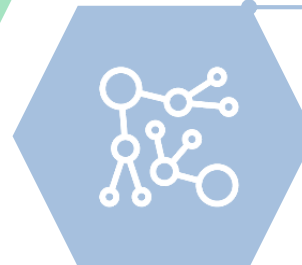
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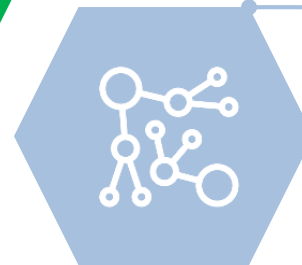

# Specific legal open source software initiatives

## Ayrault Circular (2012)



Defines the general orientations for the use of OSS in public administration. Free software must be considered equal to other solutions.

## Decree 1236/2016



Requires the creation of "provisions to propagate software built on open standards and open source software in the public sector while maintaining the efficiency of public administration" through inter-ministerial cooperation.

## OSS Directive (2012)



Instructs all agencies to give preference to the use of open source software throughout government.

## Decree 1604/2016



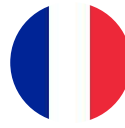
Follow-up legislation on the adoption of open source software in the public sector and the measures necessary for the dissemination of OSS based on open standards in the public sector.

## Code of Digital Administration (2013)



Makes it mandatory for Italy's public administrations to use free and open source software solutions, as stipulated in Article 68.

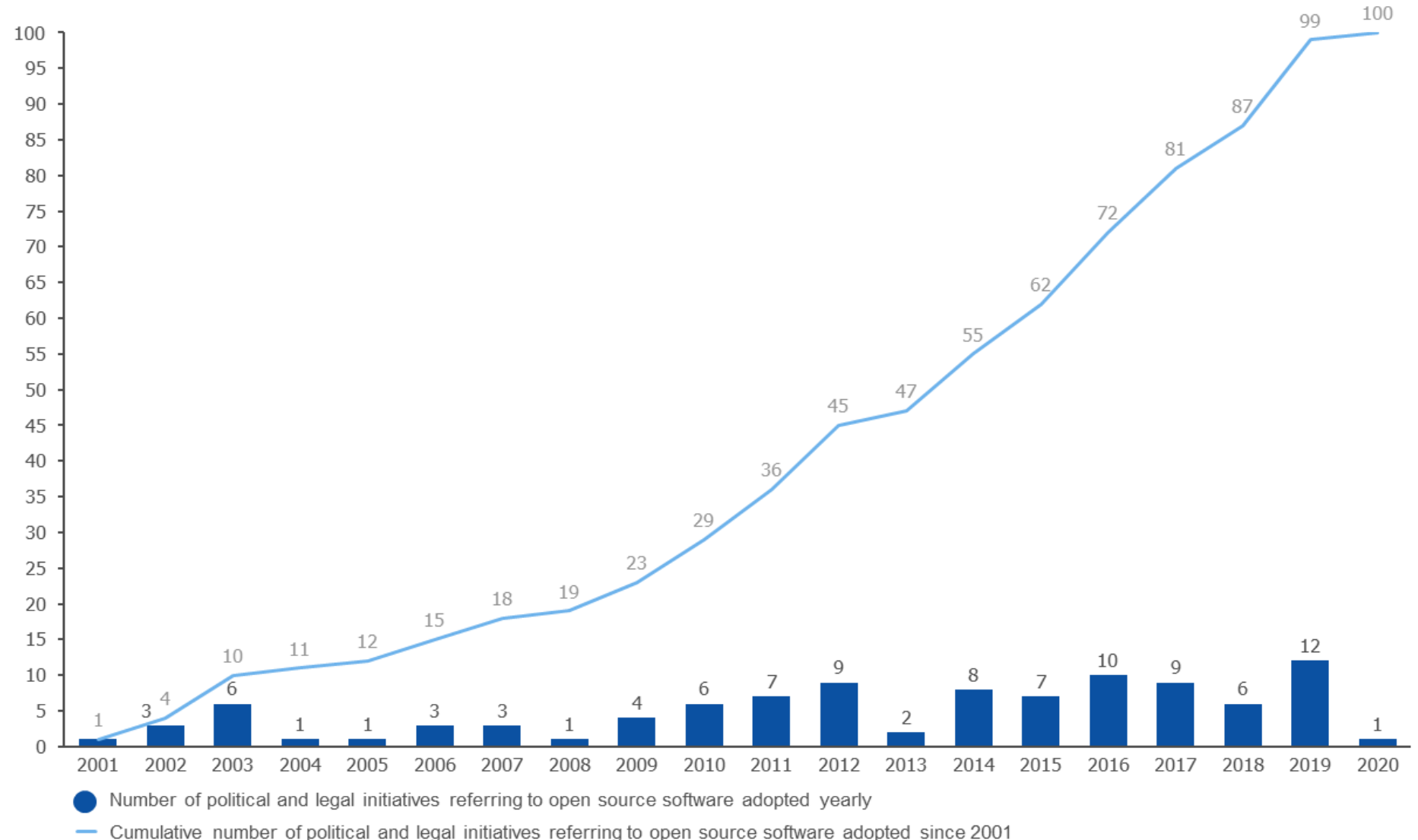
## Decree no. 2017-683 (2017)



Specifies the families of open source software licences that can be used for administrative documents that are communicable and reusable.

# Adoption timeline of political and legal initiatives

- Adoption of OSS initiatives **steadily increasing** over time
- **Positive outlook** for future initiatives following the Berlin Declaration and the Commission's Open Source Software Strategy
